## INTRODUCTION

The Ulleri Foundation, Inc. is a vital 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization on a mission to provide basic health care, education, and overall wellbeing to all members of the underprivileged remote villages in Nepal, starting from those living in and around the Annapurna Trekking Routes to those in the western regions. The Ulleri Foundation was founded in 2020 by Khakendra Pun, an independent writer and documentary filmmaker who has experienced poverty and suffering firsthand growing up in the Ulleri region of Nepal due to lack of accessible health care. In Ulleri, the sick and dying had to be carried to the nearest town, which took all day and many never made it. Khakendra has written four books chronicling his life experiences and his upbringing has given him the passion to open the foundation and provide underprivileged people with access to life-changing health care and education. He understands how difficult these are to obtain, but how vital they are to a long and productive life and has been working with the communities in and around his village for over two decades.





## NEED FOR OUR PROGRAMS

98% of all youth born in the remote regions of Nepal will leave their villages and ancestral homes to seek opportunities elsewhere in larger cities. Those who are privileged leave the country altogether in search of better opportunities. This is creating a devastating loss of culture, and irreparable harm to native Nepalese. Poverty is rampant, and there are no job opportunities in small villages. The state of the Nepal government is also a major factor in the mass exodus of youth. Corruption and incompetence within the country's bureaucracy is rampant, creating a lack of support for the country's population, lack of economic opportunity, and lack of basic health care leading to premature death. An estimated 150,000 children under 5 years of age die from entirely preventable causes.

## **OUR SOLUTIONS**

The Ulleri Foundation seeks support in its goal to provide basic health care access in the underprivileged mountain regions of Nepal, provide education opportunities in the United States for Nepalese youth ages 4-18, and work with the remote villagers to be productive users of their surrounding environments. Health care access would be achieved through the opening of small, local clinics providing primary and preventative care year-round. Scholarships would be awarded to youth living in poverty looking for better opportunities in America to then bring back their skills and learning to Nepal and the Ulleri Foundation aims to also educate villages on how to use the natural resources surrounding them to lift themselves up from poverty to prosperity.
